Guidelines for Plant donations:

Plants that grow well at your home sell well. Donations will include <u>all varieties</u> of hostas (old and new), companion perennial plants (all types) and garage sale items in good condition (i.e. stepping stones, garden sculpture, garden accessories, etc.).

As soon as you can, start digging in early spring to divide and pot up plants. Early potting lets the plants recover and they will look much better by May 19^{th.} Beautiful plants sell quickly.

If you need help digging, dividing and potting plants for the sale, you may call Cindy Tomashek at 289-2614 and arrangements will be made to offer assistance.

Potting Process Hints:

Pots and potting mix are being are being made available to members with plants to donate on a first come first serve basis. Use these materials to pot up your donations.

Doris Amundsen (282-7869, Flwrpwr58@charter.net)
Betty Olson (287-0380) and Kyle Herring (cell 602-396-2305, Kyle@herringexteriordesign.com) have volunteered to host potting mix and plant pot pick-up locations. Contact one of these volunteers when you are ready to start potting your plants.

You can use a coffee filter in the bottom of the container to keep soil in while allowing water to drain out. Once your plants are potted, keep them watered and in a location appropriate to the plant type.

Dig up the entire plant to be divided using a garden fork (it's much kinder to the root system). Use a sharp knife or shovel to divide the plant making sure to have at least 2-3 growing shoots with roots attached to each division. Immediately re-plant and water any divisions you are keeping. Be sure to disinfect your tools, garden fork, shovel, knives, etc with a 10% bleach solution between plants!

If you don't have slugs you can leave some of the soil on the roots and supplement that with potting mix; be sure to use a container large enough to hold all the roots. The root ends produce the hormone that signals the plant to grow, so you want to leave them intact if possible! Place the crown at soil level or just slightly below soil level.

Water them well and keep freshly potted plants out of the wind in a shaded location – don't let them dry out.

Please choose only healthy plants for sale. That means no distorted, funny colored (splashed, blotchy, streaky) leaves – unless of course it is one of the more unusual varieties meant to have those characteristics.

For bare root plants or if you have slugs:

Rinse all the soil off the roots by swishing it in a large bucket of water - then dip it in a 10% bleach solution to disinfect the fresh cut.

Change the water from plant to plant (if you are doing several divisions from one plant you can re-use the water). Rinse the root ends in fresh water before wrapping the roots in damp papers or paper towels. Immediately slip a plastic bag around the wrapped roots, securing it with rubber bands to keep the roots moist. The rubber bands should be snug enough to hold things in place and keep moisture in rather than strangling the plant.

Keep bare root plants in a cool, shaded location like a garage or basement. They will be fine under these circumstances for 5 days at least -- as long as the roots don't dry out. If you need assistance potting your bare root plants, the plant sale committee will help.

Over the past few months we have conducted a survey to determine what hostas our SOGHS members particularly like and have had success growing. We also asked if any hostas were of

particular difficulty or disappointment. 53 members (about half our members) responded and provided a long list of well liked hostas and a small list of problems.

139 different hostas were listed in the favored column while 40 different hostas were reported to have had some problems. "Slug feast" and poor growth were listed as the major complaints, didn't live up to promotion another. Loss of color and the "going going gone" phenomenon were also mentioned. Leaf melt and tear also caused disappointment.

Interestingly, about 1/3 of the hostas on the list of "hostas that performed poorly" were also on the favorite hosta list. 'Great Expectations' got about equal votes in both categories – 6 favorite, 7 poor performer. Some mentioned it was very slow but could overlook that problem because of the beauty of the plant. 'Tattoo' was mentioned 4 times in the favored list but 8 times in the unsatisfactory list. 'Whirlwind' and 'White Christmas' were mentioned 3 times as poor performers.

'Sum and Substance' topped the favorite list with 16 votes on the favored list. Other double digit vote getters were:

H. montana 'Aureomarginata' had 15 votes and 'June' and 'Paul's Glory' had 14 votes, 'Striptease' (11).

Following is a list of the other hostas mentioned along with votes received. You may want to give these hostas consideration for your garden as you plan additions.

Many of the hostas in the poor performers list have done very well for others so you do not want to dismiss them. Location and water may make the difference for you.

In the coming year, evaluate and keep notes on your hostas. We will redo our survey.

Foxfire Botanical Gardens is a blend of Eastern and western styles of gardening. With 15 acres, ponds and mature pines as the backdrop you will find various interpretations of these gardening styles.

Features include a waterfall, fire pit, rock gardens, a teahouse, a Torii gate and a Moongate, a fernery area, and a moss garden. Hostas, of course, are a backbone plant of the garden and are used extensively. There is also a Walter Hoover Hosta Garden, in honor of Wally, a local legend and promoter of hostas.
