Deer Don't Like Hostas? Really???

Food For Thought

Deer don't like hostas. I know you are all screaming, "Yes they do." This year I've had extra time, and who hasn't, to observe the deer and what they eat.

We have lived at our place for about 35 years. We have a herd of at least 5 that have lived here all that time. The deer generally don't bother the hostas. Once in a while in the spring, when the hostas first come up I will see a bite out of a leaf, but not a lot of damage. Sometimes when the hostas flower I will lose a scape or two, generally on the fragrant hostas.

What do the deer eat? I have seen them walk through the hosta beds to eat jewel weed, stinging nettles, Solomon seal, Asiatic lilies, tropical hibiscus, succulents, agave, cactus (the thorns don't stop them) and apples off the ground but they also stand on their hind legs to eat them off the trees.

I think what I am saying is apparently we keep our gardens too clean (not a problem at my house). We have taken away the foods they like, so they eat our hostas. - **Dave**

ark your calendars for the 2021 Hosta Plant Sale on Saturday, June 5th, 2021.

We have come up with a different plan for the 2021 Hosta Plant Sale. We want to have the sale and also make sure everyone is safe.

So, as it stands, these are our plans:

To reduce congestion, we plan to have a two-day plant drop-off on

Thursday, June 3rd and on Friday, June 4th.

- •Thursday, June 3rd will be for drop-off of larger loads of plants.
- •Friday, June 4th will be for drop-off of smaller loads of plants.
- Saturday, June 5th will be the Hosta Plant Sale.

We plan to limit the number of people in the building and have a one-way direction flow for the buyers. It will take a bit more coordination and time, but keeping the membership and shoppers safe is the goal. We still plan to have holding tables and members to help shoppers.

Please plan to pick up pots and soil for your hosta digs. We had some hostas planted in hard SE Minnesota dirt in the past and encourage all the members to use the soil we provide so the plants will be ready for a comfortable transplant into home gardens. Please also give yourself enough time to clean your pots before dropping them off so that the plant sale workers can be spread out on the setup dates.

For safety, we will have bottled water for volunteers, but we will not have a food-sharing area. Please plan to bring your own snacks and food.

ZOOM Cheat Sheet - Courtesy of Joe Parisi

If you've never or rarely use ZOOM, here are a few easy steps to get you started.

What is ZOOM?

Zoom is an on-line, internet-based, video conferencing software.

What do I need to join a Zoom meeting?

- a. Computer (Laptop or Desktop), tablet or smartphone
- b. Internet connection (WiFi or wired)
- c. An email invitation from the meeting organizer

If you're accessing Zoom from an iPad/Tablet or cell phone, you'll first need to download the ZOOM App onto your device from the App Store (Google Play Store or Apple App Store). If you're using a computer, you'll need to install the Zoom software from the Zoom Download Center website (https://zoom.us/download). You DO NOT need to create an account to join a ZOOM meeting.

Connect using the hyperlink in your email invite:

- 1. Click on the hyperlink in the email. Your web browser will open, and take you directly into the Zoom meeting. [Hyperlinks are underlined and begin with the letters 'https']
- 2. You may need to click on [open.zoom.us], especially the first time you use Zoom
- 3. If a password is required, it will be in the email from the meeting organizer. Alternately, you can go to the Zoom website: Go to https://zoom.us/join, and enter the 9-digit meeting ID from your invitation email.

When you are on the Zoom website:

- 1. If you are asked if you want to open Zoom, click "Open zoom.us."
- 2. Zoom opens, showing you a preview of your camera image.
- a. Then click either "Join with Video" or "Join without Video." If you use video, other people in the meeting will see you. If not, they will just see your name.
- b. Next, Zoom asks about audio. Click "Join with Computer Audio" so you can hear and be heard in the meeting.

Dial into the meeting on a phone:

If you don't have internet access, you can use a phone to dial into the meeting. The phone number to call will be in your invitation email.

Tips once in a ZOOM meeting:

• Once you've joined the meeting, you can see and hear other participants. Each participant is

represented by a square that displays their face (if they've chosen to join with video) or just their name.

• If you see: "Waiting for Host to Start this Meeting," just wait for them to join.

Zoom Instructions Continued

- Adjust your camera to center your face on the screen so people can see you properly.
- Your microphone and camera ON/OFF icons are in the bottom left corner of the screen.
- If you're in a large meeting, make sure your microphone is muted. Your device's microphone

is pretty sensitive, and if you're unmuted, it can pick up a lot of background noise. The mute button, which looks like a microphone, is in the bottom left corner of the Zoom screen. If the microphone has a red line through it, you're muted, and no one in the meeting will hear you. Click the button again to unmute yourself if you want to talk in the meeting.

- Only one person in the meeting can talk at a time. Zoom indicates who is speaking by highlighting their image with a colored square or line.
- In the upper right of the video display area, there will be a selection that you can toggle between: Speaker View or Gallery View.
- Speaker View will show whomever is currently speaking along with a small number of other participants at the top of the screen.
- Gallery View will fill the screen with a set of video boxes of up to 49 participants, highlighting the participant that is currently speaking. This can kind of look like a "Brady Bunch" screen.

CHAT Feature:

There is also a chat feature in Zoom, where you can type messages to other participants. Participants can send messages to everyone in the meeting, or just certain participants. However, after

the meeting, the host can view the transcript of all chats, so it's not entirely private. If there is a message for you in the chat, a notification appears on the Chat button, which looks like a

speech bubble. Click that button to open the chat window. The CHAT button at the bottom of the

screen allows you type a message to participants




LEAVING A MEETING

To leave the meeting at any time, simply Click "Leave Meeting" on the bottom right corner to leave the meeting.

If you have never used Zoom before and you feel up for an adventure in learning call Sue Martino at 507-753-2430. You will need a laptop or Smartphone and everything else is free.

I will take you through the steps to set up your device. Take a glance at the Zoom Instruction page written by Joe Parisi that is included in the newsletter on pages 5 and 6 and then give me a call.

We can set up a time to work together over the phone and get you started with a Zoom meeting right then and there! It really is quite fun and what a great way to stay socially connected in these trying times not just with SOGHS, but with family and friends.
