Tips From Experts At Hosta Symposium

From Bob Solberg's "Growing Hostas in Containers":

- •It isn't the cold that is the problem when wintering hostas in pots, it is the moisture. Hostas like to be kept dry but not bone dry. As you may remember from our last newsletter, I am attempting to winter two hostas in my unheated garage. This was a good reminder to keep adding snow. Once a month is my current plan.
- •Terracotta pots need more watering but are beautiful and fun to collect. Try placing a hosta planted in a plastic pot INSIDE the terracotta pot to help with moisture retention and lighten the load when moving it to the garage in the fall.
- •Don't over pot a hosta. Roots should get just about to the bottom of the pot. They like to be root-bound.

From Mark Zilis's "Searching for Hostas in the Wild in Japan": Mark, his son Andy, and Bob Solberg took the trip of a lifetime to Japan in search of *H. sieboldiana* in the wild. The result I will leave as a cliff hanger for you to ask Mark and Bob. What was also interesting to learn was that in Japan, hostas grow in volcanic rock. The Japanese like rough, coarse-leaved hostas and will treat their hostas with Cobalt60 to get different textural effects. Japanese also want to grow hostas that look like their originals unlike in the United States where we hybridize hostas to gain individual characteristics.

From Don Dean's "Where did That Trait Come From?":

- •Streaked hostas are traced back to *h. 'siebodii.'* silver, white wax hostas are traced back to *h. 'seiboldiana'* and blue hostas from either *h. 'seiboldiana'* or *h.* 'Tokudama'.
- •Don handed out an interesting table listing the pros and cons of hybridizing with each hosta species. It lists the characteristics one would expect to achieve and the challenges with each species.
 - •Understanding the hosta's parentage can help one understand the best growing conditions and hybridization potential.

•**H**ostas like to be kept dry but not bone dry. -Bob Solberg

From Jeff Moore's "Thoughts on Hosta Hybridizing":

- •If the scientific details of hybridization lights your interest, this is the topic for you. Jeff gave several examples of good, stable hostas to use when hybridizing new hostas. For example, H. 'Allegan Fog' is a good, stable plant to hybridize with as it will keep the "misted" characteristic.
- •A good hosta for hybridizing can come with a large price tag. Be sure to ask to see an offspring to validate viability as a hybridizing plant.

With this and more to learn from these events, I welcome you to come see for yourself at this year's American Hosta Society Convention combined with the Midwest Regional Hosta Society Convention in Green Bay, WI, June 12-15!

And don't forget another exciting educational opportunity sponsored by SOGHS. On Saturday, April 13th, join us for the Rochester Spring Garden Seminar at RCTC's Heintz Center. Select your choice of three sessions from the 12 topics presented by knowledgeable and enthusiastic teachers, and then check out the vendor area and sponsor tables!

Until then, may the snow continue to melt and the temperatures climb back up the thermostat.

WHAT I LEARNED AT 2019 WINTER SYMPOSIUM

On Saturday, February 2, the Midwest Regional Hosta Society held a Winter Symposium at the Milwaukee-Brookfield Sheraton Hotel in the Milwaukee suburb of Brookfield, an easily accessible and convenient venue. The meeting, organized by Jack Barta, included 6 excellent talks by well-know speakers in the hosta world. In addition to joining old and new friends, attendees enjoyed good food, opportunities to bid on donated hosta seeds and purchase books and T-shirts for the June AHS meeting in Green Bay.

A few of my favorite personal take-aways from the meeting follow:

Bob Solberg (Green Hill Hostas) provided an in-depth discussion of Growing Hostas Successfully in Containers.

- •In his opening remarks, Bob described some interesting European Hosta facts. Hostas in Holland are grown in open fields, since Holland is considered a cloudy country. The garden centers in Europe have a plant of the week sale that requires growers to be able to provide blooming hostas during that particular week.
- *Reasons to plant hostas in pots include poor garden soil, ease of planting and dividing, protection from tree roots and voles, water and fertilizer control, ability to "pamper" hard-to-grow hostas, portability, and the likability/appearance of pots, while negatives include the needs for more water and fertilizer, winterization, and repotting, as well as the cost of attractive pots.
- *Don't over-pot hostas, since hostas like to be pot-bound; roots should dictate the size of the pot.
- •Recommended soil mix includes peat moss, perlite, pine bark, garden soil, gravel, and a slow-release fertilizer (eg, tomato food that is rich in Magnesium).
- •Terracotta pots dry out faster than preferred plastic containers.
- •Repotting is recommended when the soil compacts or the pH drops (pH \leq 4).
- *During winter, keep hostas dry; however, soil determines watering schedule.

Donald Rawson's excellent talk, *You can have a Tree-mendous Garden*, described the problems of roots, soil, and shade, and provided numerous helpful tips to assist the gardener in allowing hostas and trees to coexist. These include the choice of trees (deep root systems), improving the soil, adding topsoil around trees, using raised beds, choosing vigorous and mature hostas, adequate watering, fertilizing and light; spading around hostas, selective root pruning, rotational planting, planting hostas in above- and below-ground containers, and use of Spin Out bags and fabric. Don described the 2-bucket system with constant reservoir for planting hostas under trees.

Don Dean, in his talk, *Where did That Trait Come From?*, discussed hosta hybridizing with an emphasis on general traits in a range of hosta species and how they relate to modern hosta cultivars. This is a very interesting but complicated area of study.

Mark Zilis (A to Z Perennials) provided a fascinating tour of hostas in Japan in his talk, *Searching for Hostas in the Wild in Japan*, which detailed his July 2018 trip to Japan with his son, Andy, and Bob Solberg in the quest of finding species *Hosta 'sieboldiana'* in the wild. This enjoyable tour de force presentation included photos of numerous "unknown" hosta species, that he, Bob and Andy encountered during their whirlwind tour of many hosta gardens, suppliers and natural habitats. This was Mark's 6th tour of Japan to study hostas. Oh, if only I was 20 years younger, I would want to have Mark as tour guide of wild hostas of Japan!



Jeff Moore in his talk, *Thoughts on Hosta Hybridizing*, detailed some interesting facts and challenges in hosta hybridizing, including the production of thousands of seedlings each year from crosses, most of which never appear in market because of a very selective culling process.

George Papadelis (Telly's Greenhouse) had attendees salivating as he described many new annual and perennial introductions in his slide presentation, New Annuals and Perennials for 2019.

Highlighted annuals included: two Alstroemerias: Alstroemeria Katiana (rose-colored) and Alstroemeria Mulan (a unique purple and lavender bicolor); a dragonwing begonia: Begonia Dragonwing Canary Wings (gold colored and shade-requiring); three Calibrachoa Superbells: Calibrachoa Superbells: Calibrachoa Superbells: Calibrachoa Superbells Holy Cow; two coleuses: Coleus Fancy Feathers Copper and Coleus Pink Poodle; a Gomphrena (Truffla Pink), and several species of vinca rosea: Vinca Tattoo Series (Black Cherry, Papaya, Raspberry, and Tangerine). Highlights of the perennials included: Achillea ptarmica 'Peter Cottontail' (white flowers, DEER-RESISTANT, resembling Baby's Breath, but long-lived); two Buddleias (both DEER-RESISTANT): Buddleia Grand Cascade (lavender) and Buddleia 'Pink Cascade' (apple blossom pink); an Echinacea: Echinacea Kismet Raspberry (16' tall, flowers last for weeks, most popular); and of hellebores, the wedding party series (Hellebores Black Tie Affair, Hellebores Mother of the Bride, and Hellebores Shotgun Wedding).

Sadly, Telly's Greenhouse does not do mail order—we'll have to organize a trip to Troy, MI, to pick up these spectacular plants in person!



Coming Soon: Time to Dig, Divide



Are you ready for the next SOGHS Hosta Sale? Let's hope that nature cooperates so that we will have ample time for our divisions to mature.

If you need help digging or have a large number of hostas that need dividing, we can help. This year we have a Dig Team headed by **Paul Koeller**. For assistance, contact Paul by email: pdkinmn@aol.com.

This year's spring Hosta Sale is on SatuIrday, June 1st, 2019, starting at 8 a.m. We need our club members' help in donating at least five hostas per person. Here are some of the things to keep in mind when donating:

- *Dig when the pips are just breaking through. Transplants will look good at sale time. For a refresher on how to divide and transplant hostas, check out these videos: https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=y90miSFQKjk, and https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=c0ELV5cNteg.
- •Contribute ONLY one "common" hosta per donation (*not all 5*). i.e.: h. 'lancefolia,' h. 'albomarginata,' and the common, solid green hostas.
- *SOGHS can supply you with dirt and pots.
- •All companion plants can be donated to the sales offered by Rochester Garden and Flower Club, or the Master Gardener sale at the historical society the same weekend. The SOGHS sale **will not** offer companion plants.

Sign-up sheets for volunteering for Friday, May 31, and Saturday, June 1 st 2019, will be at the April and May meetings. The sign-up sheets designate areas of specific needs such as cashiers, holding area help, food contributors and so forth.

•Set-up will also need specific leaders to be in charge of the alphabetized hosta groups. These people will make sure set up is correct for their portions of the alphabet including checking that all plant I.D.s are in place and that plants are in their proper places on the tables.
